11th & 12th October saw students rewarded for all of their achievements in our annual prizegivings. The prizes awarded relate to a students' performance in the previous academic year. A prize for outstanding academic achievement is awarded usually to one student in each form. Form tutor prizes are awarded to the student who makes outstanding progress, the best contribution to form life or shows excellent leadership skills. Certificates of merit are awarded for a variety of reasons; for academic achievement, for effort, progress, or for contributions to sport, drama, music, form life or school life. There are also a range of special prizes and sporting team trophies. The range of awards reflect the really varied aspects of life at Spalding High School. In addition to the academic life of the school, there is a huge range of activities and opportunities in which students can become involved, many of which are spoken about in the students' presentations; we reward those students who excel academically and who have made great progress through their hard work, but we are also congratulating students who have taken part in sports teams, in concerts and drama, those who have consistently supported others in their form or worked to help younger students and who have involved themselves in community work and fundraising. The afternoon presentations are a real celebration of all that our students achieve.

Outlook Expedition to Malawi

This summer, a group of nine Spalding High students from Years 12 & 13 were accompanied by Mrs Schwarz and Mrs Syer on an Outlook Expedition to Malawi, Africa. The month was spent volunteering at environmental and social projects around the country, before completing a four day trek phase through the mountains down to Lake Malawi, followed by a safari at Liwonde National Park.



Our time there was truly life-changing and we were incredibly lucky to have such an immersive experience, the highlight most probably being the schools that we visited, such

as the Mbwalala Primary School in northern Luwawa, and interacting with the young children at an orphanage and crisis nursery. The looks on their faces as we gave them the colourful notebooks and stationery donated by local supermarkets were unforgettable, and they were all so surprised when we managed to converse with them in their own language, Chichewa.

In Malawi, girls our own age miss a quarter of their school lives because the traditions of their culture forbid them from leaving their homes during menstruation - something that the group just couldn't quite believe. The all-girls school that we visited, Edinburgh Girls High in Mzuzu, really struck a chord with us all as it was so easy to make comparisons with our own school back in Spalding. The reusable sanitary towels that we had bought with the help of donations from our school were given to two senior students, both 17, one of which hoping to study maths at university and the other an aspiring midwife. It was clear that they were really appreciated, especially seeing as the current water shortage in the cities is making washing reusable sanitary towels considerably difficult.

We're so grateful for the generosity of everyone who helped us with our fundraising goals, without which we

might not have been able to impact so many lives in the way that we did. The sheer poverty that we encountered, yet the happiness of the people living in it, really made us appreciate our families and the quality of our lives back at home. To anyone considering taking part, I would wholeheartedly recommend the experience - I've seen a part of the world that I never thought would be possible at the age of 17, and have made memories that will truly last a lifetime.

Year 12 Geography fieldwork to Cranedale

From Sunday 9th - Tuesday 11th October, twenty four AS students went on a trip to the North Yorkshire coast. Although it was cold, wet and for most of the trip we



couldn't feel our fingers, we made the most of it and actually had a good time. On Sunday afternoon, we travelled to the Cranedale centre, where we based our studies. We have to say the welcome we had was pretty good as we were greeted by the friendly guides and a full roast dinner! I think everyone else would agree if I said the food was one of the best parts of the trip with a 3 course meal every night and a cooked breakfast in the mornings! As one student said "I have eaten a lot, I'm not going to lie"

Our time was then split into two distinct days. Monday we were focusing on our coasts topic and the physical geography of the coast. After being fuelled by our very large breakfast we travelled first to Flamborough Head. Of course it was raining but we were all in high spirits for the first day of our AS field work. Once we arrived, all wearing very attractive waterproof trousers (like the true geographers we are); we walked down a lot of steps to the beach to study the cliffs. We learnt about different processes and discussed the effects on the cliff. Next we walked to the very well named "Flamboroughsaurus" and drew a detailed field sketch. From Flamborough we journeyed south to Hornsea to focus next on managed and unmanaged beaches. By the time we had warmed up we had arrived and had to venture once again into the cold. We walked along the promenade and discussed the coastal defences in place and the effects these have. Then came the exciting part where we actually collected some data, we measured the gradient of the cliff and sediment size using different methods. After finishing this we got back on the bus and travelled back to the Cranedale centre for some much needed hot chocolate and warmth.

On Tuesday we travelled to sunny (or not so sunny) Scarborough. The second day was focused on the topic of 'Place'. We walked around the town and went to specific sites where we expressed how we felt and the perception we had of the area from our experiences. At some sites we "people watched" which was interesting to say the least. At others we wrote a word picture detailing the characteristics of the place. Once we had got our bearings we were then let loose on the high street unfortunately not for shopping in the Brunswick centre but instead to tally the number of chain and independent stores there. After a very long and cold walk along the promenade we finally regrouped and finished a discussion about what we had seen that day. Then much to our comfort we all headed back to the centre to collect our luggage to return home.

We had a very enjoyable time and learnt a lot. To top off our trip Mr Smith took us all to McDonalds, although we had to buy our own!


with industry critical software to produce an all-round, universally useful post 16 qualification.
