


Dr Peter Gorton

It is with great sadness that staff and former students of Spalding Grammar School and Spalding High School, attended the funeral of Dr Peter Gorton at the Parish Church of St. Mary and St. Nicholas yesterday (Wednesday 2nd October). Peter started at Spalding Grammar in 1977 as a chemistry teacher, then Head of Chemistry, Head of Science and Assistant Head Teacher, and served the School for more than thirty years. To the High School, Peter was one of the longest serving governors. Peter was also a governor at Spalding Parish and Spalding St John's as well as a lay minister at the Parish Church. Many staff and students will remember Peter for leading the annual Christmas Service for all the years he was able to.

Peter played such an important part in our school communities for so many years and was integral to what we do and how we do it in so many ways. Lots of staff who worked with Peter at the Grammar both in Science and across the school as AHT have been recalling anecdotes of his professionalism, love of data and wonderful sense of humour. At the High School, Peter had a significant impact as Governor, Vice Chair and Chair. He was a critical friend, loyal Link Governor and a supportive ally who always focused on the student's experience and had a tremendous passion for education and the extra-curricular, especially music; something he was so fond of listening to, especially at Prize Givings.

Peter's kindness of heart, generosity of spirt (and time) and enthusiasm for positively supporting the communities he served, mean that he was much loved and will be much missed. We may be sad but will no doubt share anecdotes and memories of a man who played such a significant role in our Schools. On behalf of all members of the Spalding Grammar and Spalding High communities our deepest condolences are with Peter's family at this sad time.

Working Together to Improve School Attendance

We are pleased that so many students have 100% attendance so far this term. Excellent attendance is essential for students to get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing, and wider life chances.

The Department for Education published its revised statutory guidance on attendance in August, including a new national framework for issuing penalty notice fines. These changes are summarised in the following update:


Life in Y11

Celebrating The Individual — Grace Bushell, 11C and Zara-Jayne Odell, 11J





Computing News

Ada Lovelace Day 2024 - Promoting STEM for girls

Ada Lovelace Day - Tuesday 8th October 2024

Ada Lovelace Day (ALD) is an international celebration of the achievements of women in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM). It aims to increase the profile of women in STEM and, in doing so, create new role models who will encourage more girls into STEM careers and support women already working in STEM. Founded in 2009 by Suw Charman-Anderson, it is now held every year on the second Tuesday of October. It features the flagship Ada Lovelace Day Live! 'science cabaret' in London, UK, at which women in STEM give short talks about their work or research in an informal, theatre-like setting.

Who was Ada Lovelace?

A daughter of Lord Byron, Augusta Ada Byron, Countess of Lovelace is widely known as the first person to recognise the potential of early computers and published what is known as an algorithm. Before most others, Lovelace recognised that computers could do more than simple number-crunching, opening the door to complex functions and ushering in the modern era of computing. She worked with Charles Babbage (considered the father of computing), and took his ideas further than even he imagined. She recognised that a maths machine could be engineered for more than just numbers, formulating the idea of developing music and images over 100 years before this was even conceived as possible.

In School we will be continuing our study of Babbage and Lovelace in Y7, with the History of Computing; beginning to look at the Core Components of a computer system with Y8, further developing our Programming with Python in Year 9 and are advertising the start of our programming club due to commence on the 1st Nov.

Y12 Curriculum Evening

The Y12 Curriculum Evening received excellent feedback from parents. It was a pleasure to welcome parents and students to the evening to outline the journey that students were going to be on over the next two years. Mrs Waldron spoke about independent learning lessons and the importance of planning their time carefully when not in taught lessons. Students and parents then had the opportunity to hear Martin Griffin speak about their A Level journey and how to make the most of their time in the Sixth Form. He suggested useful strategies and techniques to try to improve study habits to enable to plan their time in non-contacts and how consistency rather than intensity is better in the long run to help you succeed and achieve the best outcomes.

On the evening, Mrs Bushell introduced herself and her role as careers leader in school. She works closely with sixth formers to support them in their progression route planning, whether that be looking at university, apprenticeships, employment or gap years. There are many opportunities available to sixth form students both inside and outside of school and Mrs Bushell encouraged students to be proactive about seeking out and applying for such opportunities to develop skills and their overall employability for the future.

Miss Jeffery spoke about the plans for Personal Development across the two years and how the school encourages and supports our students to become confident well-rounded individuals.

Mr Blackbourn spoke about Assessment and Reporting. He stressed how the students' journey has already commenced and how what they are doing right now is so important to their future grades. Students' Projected Grades are particularly important in the context of UCAS applications.

We are really proud of how our Y12 students have settled into their A Level studies and we hope that the advice and guidance given on the evening will help them to make the most of the next two years.
